President and Board Year End Reflection

Gratitude is a Must!

This was my theme throughout 2019. Like many of you, I am thankful for a year of many blessings but acknowledge that there were also many challenges.

I am especially thankful to the leadership team of board of directors and committee chairs who worked so hard and accomplished so much despite personal challenges and responsibilities. You may be interested to know the average age of board members is approximately 44 years. That means most of us are in mid stages of our careers, with children in middle or high school, while our younger directors are beginning their career journey. Their commitment to JCA is admirable and I am inspired by them. I hope you are too.

We began 2019 optimistic about implementing a few initiatives. Among them was to make a dent in the Burn the Mortgage Campaign, secure other forms of donations and sponsorship for the building and events, focus on youth and young adult engagement and, continue to find ways to broaden the JCA brand through partnerships. JCA continues to achieve our goals relying on 100% volunteers.

This year turned out to be significant for several reasons, most notably the burning of our mortgage thanks in large part to **Denham Jolly**, but also others such as Roy Williams. Denham's donation was a welcome and timely gift. We sincerely thank him for his generosity and trust in us. We are also extremely thankful to **Kamala-Jean Gopie** for her unwavering support, encouragement and advice over the course of the Burn the Mortgage Campaign. Her \$25,000 donor matching campaign, which shifted in August from supporting Burn the Mortgage to a Donor Matching Campaign for building renovations, propelled us to host a telethon on December 28 to ensure we maximized every opportunity to secure matching funds. We raised **\$5,200** from Saturday's telethon. In total, **\$26,207.94** was raised for this campaign!! Thank you.

Outcomes

- 1. Increased supports for the community education & advocacy
- 2. Increased engagement of individuals under 35 years youth
- 3. Increased partnerships advocacy & culture
- 4. Increased number of new/renewed members and active volunteers hub & culture
- 5. Improved accountability & sustainability hub

Highlights of 2019

There were so many moments to remember this year. Committee and Event Chairs, we celebrate you.

Culture – all about Miss Lou

Beginning with the Boonoonoonos Brunch, honouring Miss Lou, and ending with a cultural trip to Jamaica in September, we celebrated the life and legacy of the Honourable Louise Bennett-Coverley. The 52 trip participants experienced the geographical, historical and cultural diversity of Jamaica. Key partners were the Jamaica Tourist Board, the Jamaica Ministry of Culture, Gender, Entertainment and Sport, McMaster University, Harbourfront Centre, and Fabian Coverley.

Youth - we launched the International Students Initiative, aimed at engaging and supporting international students from Jamaica and the Caribbean. This included a focus group and forum as well as a dinner hosted at the JCA Centre after November's Quarterly Meeting.

The Team knocked it out of the park with this year's Annual Children's Christmas Party featuring our all-time favourite Santa, Gifford Walker. Not only was this event fully sponsored by Western Union, it included traditional Jamaican Christmas storytelling by Letna Allen-Rowe and activities galore for adults and children. A fun time was had by all.

Education – the Saturday Morning Tutorial Program underwent some changes to ensure it continues to meet the needs of children in grades one to twelve. Participants enjoyed two sponsored field trips this past year, a tour of Humber College's new Barrett Centre for Technology Innovation Building and a visit to the Nelson Mandela Exhibit at the Median Arts Centre.

Community Hub – the Toronto Police Services hosted its Black History Month celebration at the JCA Centre. The Members Lounge committee ran its first successful pilot during July and August. We also partnered with several individuals and organizations to host a Community Christmas Dinner on December 25.

Advocacy – JCA responded to various issues including a request to work with TPS to address issues of gang violence in the City and understanding recent changes to immigration policy. As discussed at the last quarterly meeting, JCA has been working with two other organizations to help develop a Black credit union in the Greater Toronto Area. More to come on this in 2020.

This year's Women Health & Wellness Fair 'Healing from Trauma: Invisible Wounds' was powerful and so timely with topics addressing racism, grief and aging.

As 2019 comes to a close, I remember our beloved Daphne Bailey and other JCA members who are no longer with us, faced illness or other personal challenges this past year. It is my hope that 2020 brings you blessings and that you will continue to support the organization and celebrate the good things. Don Simon, President of the Jamaican Canadian Association Alberta posted the following on social media:




